		Jesus is saying you're not ultimately going to understand marriage unless you understand the whole issue of God making us male and female.
6.	What did you most appreciate about Sam Allberry's sermon?	 Based on Matthew 15:19-20 and Matthew 19:3-12 Sex only belongs within marriage. Marriage is between a man and a woman. The only godly alternative to that kind of marriage is to be single and celibate (i.e., sexually inactive).

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Why Allberry decided to follow Jesus in spite of the cost as a gay man:

1. Because of who Jesus is.

Jesus came not only to diagnose our hearts; he came to rescue us from ourselves. Jesus knows you better than you know yourself. Loves you more than you love yourself. More committed to your joy than you are.

2. Jesus is saying the same thing to everyone.

What Jesus teaches about marriage and sex is hard for everyone.

Sin taints every area of our lives—we are all disordered and broken.

There is no one who is straight. All of us are skewed in one way or another. No one gets what they want.

John 6: 35 Then Jesus declared, "I am the bread of life."

In the time of Jesus, bread wasn't a preference, it was life. No bread, no life.

Jesus is saying, "I am to your soul what bread is to your starving stomach."

We look for what only Jesus can give in romantic relationships.

We mistake the model of marriage as the reality of what is meant to fulfill us.

"There are times I want to be a dad and a husband, but that's not the win for me. The win for me is to get to know Jesus better and be just a bit more like him." (Sam Allberry)
