

4. The angel refuses to be manipulated. How do his actions point Samson's parents beyond religion and manipulation?
5. The refrain "And the people of Israel did what was evil in the sight of the Lord," is found in Judges 2:11, 3:12, 4:1, 6:1, 10:6, and 13:1. Starting with Samson there is a shift. Samson wants to marry an Philistine woman. Even though his parents are not paragons of faithfulness to God, they still know this is wrong. Samson responds by saying, "She is right in my eyes." (Shades of the song "If loving you is wrong, I don't want to be right," but actually worse.) Then in 17:6 and 21:25 we're told that "Everyone did what was right in his own eyes." How does this new phrase indicate deeper deterioration among God's people.
6. The two key phrases mentioned in question 5 are used to describe God's people, not the surrounding nations. It's a forgone conclusion that the surrounding nations do evil and redefine good and evil. It's easy to misapply these statements by directing them toward the darkness in our world and toward lost people. It's a warning to God's people. Reflect on its application to you and to our community of faith?

Magic plays a huge role in the world of Samson's day. The whole process of making of an idol was considered to be a magical process in that certain procedures had to be followed and certain words had to be spoken to bring life to the idol. The heart condition of the speakers didn't matter. All that mattered was that they followed the formula. They also believed they could get the gods to do certain things for them through various kinds of leverage. Manipulating the gods was a big part of Canaanite and Philistine religion. All the marks of god manipulation in that culture are present in Manoah's dealings with the angel. By learning the angel's name and getting him to accept a meal Manoah hopes to get leverage. Even Samson's name betrays the parents hearts. In a culture where naming was so important and the surrounding nations worshiped the sun, Samson's mother names him a name that means "son of the Sun." Now read Judges 13:6-25 with this in mind.
